

Every young person should have the chance to hear and play live music.

It is this simple belief that has been the driving force behind LMP's education work across the Croydon community for the past 30 years, and which has led us to renew our vision now.

Whilst we have made significant progress in this area, the fact remains that **there are still far too many children and young people who do not have access to ongoing music education**. Research continues to show that people from poorer backgrounds are far less likely to engage with the arts, and the same is true for people of global majority heritage. Equally, those who are disabled, come from a lower socioeconomic group, or don't have higher level qualifications, are also less likely to participate in the arts.

Through our work, we want to support young people to overcome the practical and perceived barriers that prevent them from accessing and engaging in music education. From financial challenges in receiving music education at home or in school, or perceptions around the "type" of person that the arts are for, we want to create spaces for artistic exploration amongst young people that reflects who they are now, and helps them grow into the people they're becoming in the future

Whilst we are proud to have such a long and rich history of delivering education work in communities across the UK, it is our home here in Croydon that our hearts are continually drawn back to.

We are well aware of the numerous, deeply complex social issues which are affecting the people of Croydon, and children and young people especially. We are also clear that any ambitions we have to effect positive change and impact simply cannot be achieved without the help, support and shared creativity that comes through partnership. So it is our hope that you will join us on this journey, that together we might make an impact now that will still be seen and felt in another 30 years.

Croydon has the highest number of children and young people under the age of 18 than any other London borough.


